




- Iroquois Theatre, Chicago, Consolidated School, December 1903, 602 fatalities-deadliest single-building disaster in U.S. history
- Cocoanut Grove, Boston, November 1942, 492 fatalities
- Ohio State Penitentiary, Ohio, April 1930, 320 fatalities

- Texas, March 1937, 320 fatalities
- Rhythm Club, Mississippi, April 1940, 294 fatalities
- Conway's Theatre, New York, December 1876, 285 fatalities









America Burning 1973..Key Finding

High Fire Loss:

Fires caused over \$11 billion in losses, 12,000 deaths, and thousands of injuries annually.

Complacency and Inaction:

The nation was complacent about fire safety and failed to implement known loss reduction strategies.

Local Government Failures:

Local governments lacked sufficient fire safety codes and competent personnel to enforce them.

Lack of Prevention:

There was a severe lack of fire prevention efforts, fire safety education, and built-in fire safety measures in buildings.


High Firefighter Casualties:

Firefighters faced high death and injury rates, requiring better training and tactics.


Emerging Hazards:

The growing threat of hazardous materials and their storage/transportation also posed a significant risk.

Leading causes of residential building fire dollar loss (2014-2023)





What is an ISO rating?

Communities get a PPC(public protection classification) score from 1 to 10.

- 1 means the community has superior property fire protection.
- 10 means the community's fire protection efforts don't meet ISO's minimum criteria.

Most points available in each PPC category:

- 10 points Emergency communications
- 50 points Fire department review
- 40 points Water supply review
- 5.5 points Community risk reduction
- 4.26 points Texas exceptions for training and technology



What is Accreditation?

The Commission on Fire Accreditation International® (CFAI) Accredited agencies are often described as being community-oriented, data-driven, and outcome-focused. They exemplify organizations that are strategic-minded and well-organized, are properly equipped, staffed, and trained.

Agency accreditation is an international recognition of achievement. It shows your community that your agency continually self-assesses, looks for opportunities for improvement, and is transparent and accountable through the application of a true third-party verification and validation process.
















Number of Fire Stations: 36
